



RoHS (Restriction of certain Hazardous Substances) bans the use of certain substances in the electrical and electronic equipment products from July 2006. Frequently this legislation has been referred to as the 'lead free' directive.

We work within our supply chain to ensure that only compliant product reaches our customers. To this end, our quality control processes and in house test facilities capture and manage the data required.

The Council of The European Union and The European Parliament has issued a directive known as the Restriction on Hazardous Substances (RoHS). This directive (2002/95/EC) restricts the use of certain substances deemed hazardous by the EU and used in electrical and electronic components and products.

The directive requires that, beginning July 1, 2006, new electrical and electronic equipment put on the market does not contain Lead (Pb), Mercury (Hg), Cadmium (Cd), Hexavalent Chromium (Cr6+), Polybrominated Biphenyls (PBB), or Polybrominated Diphenyl Ethers (PBDE). The maximum concentration levels, by weight per homogeneous material, have been set by the Technical Adaptation Committee (TAC) at 0.01% for Cadmium and 0.1% for the remaining substances.

An exemption until 2010 has been granted for Lead (Pb) in solders for servers, storage, and storage array systems; network infrastructure equipment for switching, signaling, and transmission; and network management for telecommunication.
